BEAU WELLING of the United States has made a rapid climb up the ladder in international curling.

As a late-to-the-game fan of the sport, the American has risen to the position of president

of the World Curling Federation.

Welling replaced president Kate Caithness CBE in 2022 at the conclusion of her 12-year term of office.

Welling is the 11th president of the World Curling Federation (previously the International Curling Federation) and is the second president from the U.S., following Dr. Donald F. Barcome from 1988–1990.

Welling was elected as a board member of the World Curling Federation in 2018, with his original four-year term concluding this year.

Welling was the chair of the Structural Review Group and prior to his time with the World Curling Federation was an Independent board director of the United States Curling Association from 2007 until 2018.

Welling came into the sport of curling in a rather unconventional way. He first saw the sport on television and was immediately drawn in. He got involved locally in curling and gradually worked his way up the ladder in the U.S.

“I was fascinated watching the sport on television and was able to learn a lot quickly from one of my colleagues who grew up in Northern Ontario,” recalled Welling. “Curling is a strategic game that fits my brain. I have a degree in physics so that aspect of the sport was interesting to me, as well as the fact that golf and curling are of the same ether.”

Welling is anxious to roll his sleeves up and get to work at his new position.

“I feel an incredible sense of responsibility and at the same time an incredible sense of excitement about the future of curling,” he said.

“I look forward to working with our members to advance the sport of curling to higher levels and to continue the great work that Kate Caithness has done. I want to honour her legacy by continuing to drive the sport forward.”

Welling is the Founder and President of Beau Welling Design, a golf course design and development company based in Greenville, S.C.

THE WORLD CURLING FEDERATION

The World Curling Federation is the recognized governing body of curling in the world.

The WCF's first formal constitution was approved in 1967 under the original charter of the International Curling Federation in Perth, Scotland. The constitution was significantly adjusted in 1982, when the federation was declared independent from Scotland's Royal Caledonian Curling Club, to which its original constitution had been tied. In 1990, the official name was changed to World Curling Federation. Further significant changes were made in 1994.

The WCF has a four-part mandate:

- To represent curling internationally and to facilitate the growth of the sport through a network of member associations
- To formulate rules of the sport of curling for world competition and all other competitions approved by the WCF and to further the interests of world curling
- To conduct world curling competitions
- To provide co-operation and mutual understanding among member associations and to unite curlers throughout the world

CURLING CANADA 2023-24 BOARD OF GOVERNORS



MICHAEL SZAJEWSKI Chair

Two governors were re-elected and one new governor was elected to the Curling Canada Board of Governors, it was confirmed during the

organization's Annual General Meeting. Later, another new face to the Board was appointed.

The governing body for the sport of curling in Canada conducted its virtual AGM, bringing together Canada's 14 Member Associations along with invited guests to talk about the past season, as well as elect new members to the Board of Governors.

There were three available spots after Roselle Gonsalves of Edmonton and Scott Hindle of Ottawa completed their terms, and Amy Nixon of Calgary departed the Board in July after voluntarily returning to the Board earlier in the season to help with on-boarding four new Governors.

Both Gonsalves and Hindle ran for re-election and won four-year terms.

Jeremy Woo of Winnipeg was elected to a two-year term while Laura Walker of Edmonton was later appointed. Walker is a member of Curling Canada's Athletes Council. She will be the first full-status Curling Canada athlete governor.

Those four join fellow Governors Ray Baker of Dauphin, Man., Jennifer Howard of Courtice, Ont., Kathy O'Rourke of Cumberland, P.E.I., Darren Oryniak of Winnipeg, Teri Palynchuk of Nanaimo, B.C., Calvin Seaman of Calgary, and Michael Szajewski of Kenora, Ont.

Szajewski was re-elected as Chair of the Board of Governors.

"We continue to take significant strides forward as a sport and as an organization, and I know our Board is ready to contribute in any way we can, as we have a shared vision and ambition alongside our Member Associations to make our sport better and more welcoming for everyone," said Szajewski.

"We're in good hands for the rest of this year with Danny Lamoureux serving as our interim Chief Executive Officer," added Szajewski. "The process for determining a new full-time CEO is well underway."







The award winner is selected annually by competitors in the World Women's Curling Championship as the player who best combines playing ability with sportsmanship. The award was named in honour of Scotland's Frances Brodie, one of curling's pioneering women. Brodie helped establish the women's world championship and chaired the first such event in Perth, Scotland, in 1979. The award was presented for the first time in 1989.



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



CURLING CANADA AWARDS

Where would curling be without the tremendous work by the various men and women — many behind the scenes — who work tirelessly for their sport.

They are the backbone of curling, and it's only fitting some of the best be honoured for their contributions to curling over the past season.

AWARD OF ACHIEVEMENT

The award recognizes individuals who have contributed significantly to curling in one of four areas — builder, technical development (instructor, coach, official, ice technician), marketing and media.

SCOTT HIGGINS

Curling fans love their sport on television, and one of the key individuals who brings it to them is Scott Higgins, Senior Producer, Live Events, for TSN in Toronto.

Since joining TSN 34 years ago, Scott Higgins has been around the world as an integral part of the network's behind-the-scenes broadcast team. But it is his work at curling events over the past 20 years that has continuously raised the bar of

excellence and provided thousands of hours of entertainment to curling fans across Canada.

Higgins's passion for curling and its people comes through loud and clear on TSN broadcasts. He oversees all content and the presentation of TSN's curling coverage while leading the network's talented group of storytellers. His goal has always been to ensure that each broadcast embodies the right balance of analysis and entertainment for the viewer at home.

His first major Canadian championship event was the 2003 Scotties Tournament of Hearts in Kitchener, and he's been at just about every Season of Champions since then.

JENNIFER KJELL AND KRISTI PETRUSHCHAK

Jennifer Kjell and Kristi Petrushchak don't throw any shots (on camera) but their contributions to curling are profound, nonetheless

Kjell is the Senior Events Manager, while Petrushchak is the Event Director for the Grand Slam of Curling series, which puts the world's

best men's and women's curling teams on the ice in the biggest events outside of national and world championships.

The Grand Slam series, owned and operated by Rogers Broadcasting, is a crucial training ground for curling teams from around the world, and a staple for TV viewers in Canada, and Kjell and Petrushchak have played crucial roles for more than a decade in the success of the Slams.

They are involved in all aspects of the organization of the events, including securing

venues, local and national marketing, player relations, sponsorship relations, event formats, scheduling, and working with host committees.

Kjell and Petrushchak also were instrumental in making the Slam events equal for men and women. When they started working for Rogers in 2011, women played in only one Slam event. Four years later, all Slams featured men's and women's teams and equal prize money.

Kjell and Petrushchak also were deeply involved alongside Curling Canada in the execution of two safe and successful Grand Slam events that were held in the Calgary bubble in 2021.

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

The Curling Canada Volunteer of the Year Award is based on the nominee's contributions from the previous curling season, in any number of areas.

And when it comes to giving back to the sport of curling, and his home club in particular, Northey has earned the respect and admiration of his fellow members for his volunteer efforts on and off the ice.

His latest projects took place during the 2021-22 season. Among the projects he oversaw and contributed to were installing a new cement ice floor for the three-sheet rink, rebuilding walkways and installing insulation, a vapour barrier, pipes and rebar for the cement floor.

And on top of that he was the project manager for the installation of a new ice plant when the old plant failed in January 2022.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION AWARD

The Board of Governors Special Recognition Award is awarded to an individual or organization whose unique contribution(s) or achievement(s) significantly impact the sport of curling in Canada. Award is based on the nominee's contributions from the previous curling season, in any number of areas.

DR. ROBERT MCCORMACK

Dr. Robert McCormack — known universally as Dr. Bob — has been working with Canadian curlers for years in his role as the Chief Medical

Officer for the Canadian Olympic Committee from 2005 to 2019.

In the summer of 2020, he took on a great role with the Canadian curling community as he became involved in the planning and the eventual successful execution of the Calgary Curling Bubble that saw seven major championship events staged safely and responsibly over a three-month stretch.

Dr. Bob designed the medical protocols that resulted in no positive tests among curlers and staff members situated inside the bubble. His protocol became the gold standard for other sporting events.

RAY KINGSMITH AWARD

The Ray Kingsmith Award is named after the man who played a leading role in bringing curling to the Winter Olympic family. He was a tireless volunteer in administration and management roles in the sport of curling. The award honours individuals who best demonstrate a similar commitment and dedication to our sport that made Kingsmith the consummate sport executive.

ELAINE BRIMICOMBE

If it happens on the ice or off the ice when it comes to curling in the Ottawa Valley, chances are very good that Elaine Brimicombe is involved.

Major events such as the 2023 BKT Tires & OK Tire World Men's Curling Championship, the 2017 Tim Hortons Roar of the Rings

Canadian Curling Trials, the 2016 Tim Hortons Brier and the 2007 and 2015 Canadian Wheelchair Curling Championships all had Brimicombe's touch on them, as she either chaired or vice-chaired host committees for them.

But championship events have hardly been Brimicombe's only focus. She has volunteered countless hours at the club level in helping to organize Learn to Curl sessions for new players, particularly in the discipline of wheelchair curling. In addition to coordinating the long-running Cathy Kerr International Wheelchair Bonspiel, Brimicombe

has created a plan to offer two Try It days for wheelchair curlers and one-10 week dedicated Learn to Curl for wheelchair curlers. Her current work-in-progress is a proposal to create opportunities for youth wheelchair curlers.

Brimicombe also has been active as a board member, including three years as Chair of the CurlON board.

KEN THOMPSON

Ken Thompson of Kingston, Ont., a member of the Rotary Club of Kingston since 2003, has spent countless hours working behind the scenes on successful major curling events in Ontario, and it all started at the 1974 Brier in London, Ont., where he volunteered as a driver for visiting media.

Since then, he has chaired or vice-chaired four Canadian curling championships — the 2020 Tim Hortons Brier and the 2017 Canadian Curling Club Championships in Kingston, the 2013

Scotties Tournament of Hearts and the 1991 Brier in Hamilton.

He's also been active at the local level, serving as a board member, a former curling board chair and president at the Cاتاraqing Golf and Country Club in Kingston.

Thompson also showed his journalism skills as a feature writer and co-owner of the Ontario Curling Report.

"It's a great honour to be recognized by the national governing body of the sport that I have dedicated decades to. It's wonderful," Thompson said. "Ray Kingsmith was a guy who was devoted to the sport of curling.

"I've chaired or co-chaired four national championships. I don't know a lot of people who have done that."

The award was created in 2007 by the Canadian Curling Reporters — now the Professional Curling Media Association of Canada — in conjunction with TSN, in memory of McLean, a TSN executive producer, and his dedication to the sport of curling. McLean passed away on Dec. 14, 2005, at his home in Brampton, Ont., after a two-year battle with cancer. He was 39.

As the quantity of entries received for Curling Canada's For the Love of Curling scholarship program increases, so does the quality of applications. Curling Canada is proud to announce the newest class of scholarship recipients in a record-setting year for the program.

There were 93 submissions for the 2023 For the Love of Curling scholarship program, which sets a record for the program that has been in operation for nearly a decade. With the recipients named this year, the program eclipses the century mark in the number of scholarships provided, with 106 scholars receiving a total of \$200,800 to date.

"The growth and impact of this program since 2014 is truly inspiring. Thanks to the generosity of the Canada-wide curling community, we set out to support our future champions in their personal curling journeys," said Curling Canada Philanthropic Program Manager Brodie Bazinet. "This program has made life-changing investments in more than 100 junior curlers nationwide. We are now seeing these 'future' champions come full circle, competing at men's and women's Canadian championships. Plus, they are leaders in our sport as proud role models for the next generation of curlers."

The For the Love of Curling selection panel selected 11 recipients this year who will each receive a \$2,500 scholarship.

Of the 11 recipients, the Governor General's Curling Club – an honorary society under the patronage of the Governor General since 1874 – selected one deserving applicant to receive a scholarship financially supported by donations from its members worth \$2,500. "As a member of the reigning Canadian junior men's

championship team, Benjamin is preparing to represent Canada in international competition during the 2023-24 curling season. We are proud to provide him with a scholarship of \$2,500 to support his educational goals and aspirations of wearing the Maple Leaf this season and beyond," said Governor General's Curling Club selection panel member Wil Thurlow. "This scholarship, supported by donations from our membership, aims to invest in the future of curling in Canada and in athletes like Benjamin."

Morin will be honoured by the Governor General's Curling Club at its annual general meeting and dinner at the Courtyard Marriott Edmonton West on Sept. 11 in Edmonton.

All applicants were required to demonstrate excellence on the ice, community leadership and academic achievement.

A seven-person selection panel determined the 11 scholarship recipients. The panel included outgoing Curling Canada CEO Katherine Henderson, Helen Radford (Curling Canada), Michael Szajewski (Curling Canada Board of Governors Chair), Donna Krotz (leadership representative), Wil Thurlow (Governor General's Curling Club) and former scholarship recipients Nathan Young, Emily Deschenes and Johnson Tao.

The Curling Canada philanthropic program, introduced during the 2013-14 season to help develop and grow youth and junior curling across Canada, received donations totalling more than \$620,000 last season. Programs such as The Egg Farmers Rocks & Rings presented by Curling Canada, Girls Rock and For the Love of Curling scholarships are only made possible thanks to the generous support of Canada's curling community.
